



If you feel a bit nervous about what to do or what to expect, that's perfectly normal. Your interview is effectively an extension of your UCAS application. It's a chance for admissions tutors to get to know more about you, and a chance for you to get to know the university.

Know where and when you're going

Check your invitation to interview carefully. You should be given the name of the university, the name of the department, the name of the course, the name of the interviewer, the date and time of the interview, and the address of the university. If you are not sure about any of this information, contact the admissions office of the university.

Check the university website for information about the location of the university and the department. You should also check the university website for information about the course you are applying for.

Check you've got everything you need

Check that you have all the documents you need for your interview. You should have your UCAS application form, your UCAS personal statement, your UCAS reference form, your UCAS predicted grades, your UCAS course choice form, and your UCAS interview form. You should also have your UCAS interview form with you.

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Try to feel (or at least look!) ready

Quick tips

1. Read your invitation to interview thoroughly. You need to know where you are going, what time your interview is, and what you need to bring with you.
2. Read over your UCAS application, information on the course you have applied for and some general information about the university to prepare.
3. Do some extra reading. Have there been any developments in your field? E.g. Any new research developments in
4. Think about your future, do you know what you want to do with you degree? Do you have career plans?
5. Dress formally but comfortably.
6. Prepare questions to ask your interviewer.
7. Use the interview as an opportunity to learn as much about the university as possible.
8. Stay positive and calm.
